Catalina Diaz

Catalina Diaz is the Director of the Department of Transitional Justice, in the Ministry of Justice, in Colombia. Catalina has worked on the design and implementation of transitional justice mechanisms in Latin American and has published on the rights of victims to reparation, and transitional justice more generally. Catalina worked at the International Centre for Transitional Justice (ICTJ) and has been a consultant at the Toledo International Center for Peace (CITpax), the German Agency for International Development Cooperation (GIZ), the United Nations Development Program (UNDP), the National Center for Historical Memory and the Colombian NGO Fundación Social.

Eduardo González

Eduardo González is a human rights consultant and sociologist, with a specialization in transitional justice. Eduardo was the former director of the Truth and Memory programme at the International Centre for Transitional Justice. A Peruvian national, he participated in his country's Truth and Reconciliation Commission. More recently he was an advisor to the Tunisian government. He has contributed to the establishment and operations of truth and reconciliation processes in about 20 countries, providing technical and strategic advice.

Andra Mobberley

Andra is a New Zealand qualified Barrister and former prosecutor at the International Criminal Tribunal for Rwanda (ICTR). She was a contributing author to "Prosecuting Mass Crimes: A Compendium of Lessons Learned and Suggested Practices" a three-year study of prosecutorial practices at the International Tribunals for Rwanda, the former Yugoslavia, Sierra Leone, Cambodia and Lebanon. Andra specialises in large scale and



complex litigation. She has worked with witnesses who have suffered extreme trauma resulting from widespread and systematic violence and human rights abuses. She has written curricula for advocacy training for international prosecutors and has conducted advocacy training for prosecutors at the International Criminal Court.

Andra previously worked as Crown Counsel at Crown Law (the Office of the Solicitor General of New Zealand) providing legal representation and advice for the New Zealand Government on international and domestic criminal law, human rights, indigenous rights issues, refugee matters, and extradition. She was also Principal Solicitor at the Department of Corrections (New Zealand's prison service).

Judge Erik Møse

Judge Erik Møse of the Supreme Court of Norway, is currently a judge at the European Court of Human Rights in Strasbourg since 2011. He was previously a judge and the President of the International Criminal Tribunal for Rwanda. He has served as a judge of the Court of Appeals in Oslo; Supreme Court Barrister, and before that, Deputy-Judge and Head of Division in the Ministry of Justice. He chaired, inter alia, the Council of Europe's Steering Committee for Human Rights, the expert committee which drafted the European Convention for the Prevention of Torture, and the committee on the incorporation of human rights conventions into Norwegian law.

Kelli Muddell

Kelli Muddell is the Director of the Gender Justice Program (GJP) at the International Center for Transitional Justice (ICTJ) in New York. She has been with ICTJ since its inception in March 2001, and with the GJP since it was created in 2005. With the GJP, Kelli has provided technical assistance to women's groups and policymakers in over 15 countries on how to design and implement transitional justice measures in ways that address gender-based violence and are responsive to the gendered consequences of human rights violations, including in Tunisia, Nepal, Uganda, Sierra Leone, Colombia, Israel, and Palestine. Kelli has conducted and overseen research projects which have contributed to expanding the way in which transitional justice has conceptualized gender issues and conflict related harms. These topics have included how transitional justice mechanisms have failed to address the targeting of sexual minorities; the ways in which measures of truth, acknowledgement, redress and reform have grappled with sexual violence against men and boys; and the gendered consequences of the crime of enforced disappearance.

Nelson Camilo Sánchez is a research co-ordinator at the Center for the Study of Law, Justice, and Society – ‘**Dejusticia**’ - and an Associate Professor at the Universidad Nacional de Colombia in Bogota. He holds a JD from the Universidad Nacional de Colombia and an LL.M in International Legal Studies from Harvard Law School.
